### Ofsted Inspection 9.5.17



On Tuesday, school was inspected by HMI inspectors who spent a full day in school watching lessons, interviewing the head and deputy and meeting with school leaders. They also met with our governors and a range of staff and children to talk about their perspectives on school life.

The inspectors scrutinised our assessment data over the last few years, as well as our most recent assessments. They monitored children's books in order to evaluate standards and then triangulated all of this information to arrive at a judgement about our school.

I cannot share the outcomes of the inspection until I have the final report, which will hopefully be around Whit. I can tell you, however, that our children were an absolute credit to us, as always.
